Reading Group



Conferences


This year we organized the European Society of Comparative Literature (ESCL) conference, which gave us the opportunity to meet many of you in person at our headquarters, the Universidad de Alcalá (Spain).

Urban Imaginaries (with EROSS) was held at the Universidad de Alcalá on 24-26 of May 2023, with 78 participants and keynote talks by Professors Rachel Falconer and Sayak Valencia. We spent three wonderful (and unusually cold) days together, and we would like to express our gratitude to all attendees for being so active during panel discussions and for contributing to a friendly atmosphere.
